Begin saving toward your goals. This should include short term (car etc.) and long term (home deposit, children saving, retirement, etc). With the research you have done you should have a good idea what your target should be. Please use your funds wisely.

Learning both languages: Learning a second language is not an easy task. You should stick with this and set target to where you should be at. By year three you should be at high intermediate or advance. keep at it, it can help your career.

Work experience. Regardless of what level your first job is you need to start earning Canadian work experience. This will open more opportunities along your career path.

Healthy routines. Health is very important. Please ensure this as one of the things you focus on to maintain or improve

Mortgages. You may not yet have the deposit but please have the discussion now and start saving for it now. The greater the understanding of your options you have the better.

Affordable accomodation. You should be able to locate affordable temporary accomodation. Your first year in Canada is complete. Therefore at this point you should have an idea of where you want to settle. During the transition while saving for your deposit you may consider the best priced option that works best with your schedule and budget.

Registered retirement saving plan: You need to start investing for you retirement and you need to start now. The earlier you start the better and being wise financially as an immigrant is something that you have to do. You are build a future for your children who would be Canadian so put away something now so you can enjoy retirement later.

Study: Planning for you future advancement may involve study, networking and gaining soft skills. After three years you should have completed some type of certification or maybe are in process of completing. A Canadian certificate can be helpful in the future.
